President's Message

Catharina Goldnau



The last year has seen a gradual transition from the pandemic restrictions and hesitations back into almost normal life with FUSION resuming old and new programming. The first FUSION conference after the pandemic was held at Todmorden Mills in Toronto, featuring two local artists from Toronto: Joon Hee Kim and Julie Moon under the theme "Cross-Cultural Reflections". The two artists demonstrated for a weekend in front of a spirited and grateful crowd of people who all enjoyed getting together again after the pandemic. The demonstration time was spiced up with the raffling of numerous generous door prizes provided by Tucker's, Mayco, PSH and delicious food was provided all weekend by Longo's. We also awarded over \$8000 in FUSION Awards to applicants, including the \$2000 special 2022 Mary Lou Gilchrist Award that went to Jane Garcia for her beautiful sculptures.

At the last AGM, three important by-law changes have helped us smooth operations and facilitate the running of the organization: our quorum has been lowered, the board was given authority to update membership contributions and the annual audit has been changed to an annual financial review. All of these changes are congruent with and taken directly from the ONCA guidelines that govern not-for-profits in Ontario.

The FUSION board officially welcomed Mike Thome, Adeline La and Dana Dallal to the Board at the last AGM. Adeline is known to many as the manager of the Gardiner Shop, Dana became our first student rep as she was in her last year in the ceramics program at Sheridan College and Mike is an accountant with over 30 years as a CFO. FUSION's new website and database were launched just after the AGM and it's a major improvement and cost savings from the old system. Check out the HOME page for a quick listing of upcoming events or the WHAT'S ON page for links to FUSION's programs. We are still transitioning members to the database of the new website when they renew their memberships.

In October, FUSION, in collaboration with the Ottawa Guild of Potters hosted a glaze chemistry workshop with John Britt. The workshop spanned three days and was sold out in the first week of posting it.

November witnessed a successful Clay and Glass Show at Wychwood Barns in Toronto, which brought out 40 artists and a wonderful community spirit over the weekend. We had a bistro area with some food vendors and are planning on expanding the show to a festival this year.

The Wychwood Barns show also became the opening weekend of the new FUSION: CONNECT ONLINE exhibition that opened by projection on the large screen at the Barns and played all weekend, featuring work and images of all participating artists. The show is celebrating our artists - YOU - and featured a gallery of works as well as a video of artists which is still hosted on the new FUSION website. I hope you are applying to it this year again.

FUSION initiated another holiday gift exchange between members in January 2023 where participants were given a name of a person to send a gift to.

February saw the opening of FIREWORKS at Neilson Park Creative Centre in Etobicoke. This is our traveling exhibition which is slated to take place in four locations between March and November 2023. From Neilson Park, the show moved to the Gardiner Museum, the Art Gallery of Burlington and finally to the Rails End Gallery in Haliburton. For the opening exhibition, FUSION collaborated with the **Ontario Society of Artists and Flick the** Switch Art Collective, hosting large 2-D artwork on walls. The show was truly beautiful and a testament to the collaborative spirit between artists and audiences.



Creative Directions Report

FUSION's workshops have been instrumental in fostering skill development and enhancing the artistic knowledge of our member participants.

The Atmospheric Firing with Dan Hill program was developed as a joint venture with the Deep River Potters Guild, with five sessions taking place between April and June, 2022. The introductory weekend was held at the lovely library event space in Deep River and the group also enjoyed a potluck gathering. Dan Hill hosted the next three meetings at his studio in Wilno, Ontario. This smaller group of 10 participated in the hands-on surface treatment with their pieces, in preparation for the group soda firing. The follow-up kiln unloading and critique session was very informative and everyone came away with enthusiasm and an enhanced understanding of the atmospheric firing process.

In October of 2022, FUSION partnered with the Ottawa Guild of Potters to host a 3-day glaze workshop with John Britt. This handson workshop provided attendees with the opportunity to learn about making and testing glazes. The workshop included a lecture-only option on Saturday as well. John's easygoing nature and sense of humour made for a light, yet engaging learning environment. Participants worked together to measure, mix and apply their glazes to a variety of clay bodies. Over 1,000 test tiles were the result of this team effort. Special appreciation goes to Tucker's Pottery Supplies for their generous support and Amaranth Stoneware for providing gifts to each participant.

Thanks to the Ottawa Guild of Potters members Liz Fournier, Barbara Minish, Natalie Gosselin, Fiona Jarvis and Rachelle O'Keefe for their hard work and support. Participants will set learning goals and objectives and receive group critiques to stretch their practice and grow in confidence. The 8-month program will culminate in an exhibition in the Spring of 2024. We look forward to the transformative learning experience this mentorship will offer to clay and glass artists.



Magazine Report



There are currently 18 guild organizations that are members of FUSION. We stayed in touch via quarterly Zooms with guild representatives from across Ontario.

Collaborative workshops included the soda firing with Dan Hill and the Deep River Potters Guild), and the John Britt glaze workshop in partnership with the Ottawa Guild of Potters. The Pine Tree Potters Guild will host our FUSION conference in the spring of 2024.

We rescheduled the Clay and Glass Show from October to November to accommodate members' schedules, allowing attendance to the John Britt workshop and participation in annual guild sales. Co-chaired by myself and Catharina Goldnau, the event's success was achieved thanks to the entire FUSION Board and volunteers. Many of us hosted out-of-town artists. The show featured work by emerging and established artists including the launch of CONNECT ONLINE on the big screen at Wychwood Barns, demonstrations in clay and glass, a café area and live music. Special thanks to Jenny Rushforth of Desjardins Insurance, Gay Longo of Longo's for sponsoring the opening reception, Minna Koistinen and the D'Amico Group. The Clay and Glass Show grossed over \$46,000.

This year's Cay & Glass Show and Festival will once again take place at Wychwood Barns from October 20th to 22nd, with the opening and awards ceremony on Friday, October 20th. We look forward to seeing you there!

Annual Conference

The FUSION Conference, "Cross-Cultural Reflections", was held May 28 - 29, 2022 at the Paper Mill Theatre, Todmorden Mills, Toronto. Presenters Julie Moon and Joon Hee Kim captured the attention and engaged with the audience of over 50 artists and collectors, some travelling from as far away as British Columbia and Quebec. Several artists were billeted with FUSION members during the conference weekend. This was FUSION's first in-person event after the lockdowns and everyone expressed how great it was to be back face-to-face.

Julie Moon received her MFA from Alfred University in 2010 and has exhibited widely across Canada and the U.S. She has participated in many artist residencies, including Anderson Ranch Arts. Julie is a recipient of the Ontario Arts Council and Canada Council Grants. Joon Hee Kim completed her MFA at Chelsea College of Arts in the UK before undertaking professional practice in Europe and Japan. She was the winner of the 2021 Winifred Shantz Award for Ceramics. Her work has been exhibited in Canada, the USA, and the UK.

Several sponsors supported the conference including Gina and David Davidson of FundyView, Jenny Rushforth of Desjardins Insurance, Gay Longo of Longo's Grocery Stores, and Tucker's Pottery Supply. Breakthrough PLUS

The "Breakthrough Plus" Exhibition was held from May 17 - June 5, 2022 at the Leslie Grove Gallery on Queen Street West and the Gagné Contemporary Gallery in Toronto.

The exhibition featured new work by emerging and established clay and glass artists from Ontario and across Canada.

Over 150 works were submitted and 35 clay and glass works were selected featuring new work by established and emerging artists.

The work was juried by John Gagné, the curator and owner of Gagné Contemporary Gallery. Gagné's gallery specializes in mixed media works, painting, sculpture and outsider art.

The Breakthrough Plus exhibition opening and the FUSION Conference were held together at Leslie Grove Gallery on Saturday, May 28 in the evening. The event was well attended by clay and glass artists and was one of the first in-person exhibitions FUSION organized after COVID.







Awards and Scholarships

This year, FUSION awarded \$6500 in awards and scholarships to clay and glass artists. From those just starting out in their artistic journey to artists who are established and rooted in their careers, FUSION wishes all wonderful and well-deserved success.

Treasurer's Report

Mike Thome, Treasurer

After several years of greatly restricted programming due to the COVID-19 pandemic, FUSION was able to resume its normal programming this past year. In particular, the spring conference and fall clay and glass show were both resurrected. Largely due to this, FUSION returned to profitability in fiscal 2023, with net income of \$1,134 compared to a loss of \$16,919 in fiscal 2022. Revenues increased to \$153,704 this year from \$64,090 last year. Most of this increase came from higher program revenues - \$87,489 in fiscal 2023 versus \$10,068 in fiscal 2022. Membership revenue also increased (\$16,623 in 2023 from \$10,0065 in 2022) as many lapsed members rejoined to take advantage of the increased programming. In addition, we saw a significant increase in donations from various sponsors. FUSION continued to receive a grant of \$21,200 from the Ontario Arts Council this past year, but no longer received any COVID subsidies from the federal government. \$10,025 was received in fiscal 2022, but those subsidies were eliminated and not available this past year.

Expenses for this fiscal year were \$152,570, up from the previous year's expenses of \$82,009. The bulk of the increase was due to higher programming costs - \$65,174 in fiscal 2023 versus \$5,499 in fiscal 2022. Excluding programming costs, FUSION's expenses in fiscal 2023 were \$87,396 compared to \$76,510 in the prior year. With the increased revenues, FUSION granted an additional \$5,250 in awards and bursaries. As well, wages and benefits have increased to support the increased programming and activities this year. Other overhead costs, including bookkeeping, office rent, insurance, and legal and audit, which are required to keep FUSION operational, were kept steady year over year.

FUSION had the financial stability to see us through the difficult COVID years and has sufficient cash reserves even with the upcoming repayment of the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) loan to continue with our programs and activities in future years.

We are looking forward to building on our success this past year. We would also like to thank our partners including members, guilds, sponsors and donors, volunteers, the Ontario Arts Council and other government agencies for their continued support.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

1. Basis of Organization

Operations:

FUSION: The Ontario Clay and Glass Association (the "Association" or "FUSION") is a not-for-profit organization incorporated in 1975 under the laws of the Province of Ontario without share capital and is a registered charity under the Income Tax Act (Canada).

The Association's mandate is to encourage and promote quality in clay and glass and to provide educational resources and community based programming.

Accounting Framework

The Organization prepares its financial statements in accordance with the Institute of Chartered Professional Accountants of Canada (CPA, Canada) Handbook, Part III, Canadian accounting standards for not-for-profit organizations (ASNPO) applied on a basis consistent with that of the preceding year.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The accounting policies of the Organization outlined below are those policies considered particularly significant.

Basis of Accounting

These financial statements were prepared using the accrual basis of accounting. The accrual basis recognizes revenues as they become available and measurable; expenses are recognized as they are incurred and measurable as a result of receipts of goods or services and the creation of a legal obligation to pay.

Fund Accounting

The organization follows the fund method of accounting for contributions. Restricted contributions are recognized in the appropriate fund, as revenue in the year in which the related expenses are incurred. Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount can be estimated and collection is reasonably assured. The following funds are maintained:

Endowment Fund

Restricted contributions which are to be held in perpetuity are recorded in the Organization's endowment fund. The Fireworks Henry Goodman Best in Show Award Endowment Fund was established in fiscal 2000 for ongoing support of The Fireworks Henry Goodman Best in Show Award. Investment income derived from the endowment fund is made available for The Fireworks Henry Goodman Best in Show Award.

Operation Fund

Any contribution, on which there is no restriction, is allocated to general operating revenues.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

Fund Accounting - Continued

Scarborough Potters' Guild Fireworks Award Fund

In fiscal 2005, the Association received a gift in the amount of \$6,275 from the Scarborough Potter's Guild to fund a purchase award program. Since 2005, awards and expenses totaling \$3,620 have been granted from this fund.

Management Reserve

The Board has imposed an internal restriction on net assets which may be allocated to awards, capital, or to fund contingencies for future operations; including recovery of operations from the effects of the Covid-19 pandemic.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

Cash includes current bank deposits, deposits held by virtual on-line accounts, cash on hand, and investments with a maturity date of less than 90 days from the year end date.

Pottery Collection

The pottery collection represents the Association's collection of art work from shows. The value of the works of art has been excluded from the statement of financial position except for a nominal value of \$1. Accessions of art for the collection, both purchased and those gifted, are expensed in the year of acquisition. Gifted works of art are recorded as revenue at values based on appraisals by independent appraisers for valuations in excess of \$1,000 or by management for items of lesser value. As a collection of art, this asset is not subject to amortization as works of art have cultural and historical value that is worth preserving and the Association has the commitment and resources to protect and preserve them.

Contributed Services

The work of the Association is heavily dependent on the voluntary service of its members. Since these services are not normally purchased by the Association, and because of the difficulty of determining their fair value, the value of donated volunteer services is not recognized in these statements.

Capital Assets

Purchased capital assets are recorded at cost. The Association periodically reviews its capital assets to eliminate obsolete items. Amortization is provided over the assets' estimated useful lives as follows:

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

Revenue and Expense Recognition

The Association follows the deferral method of accounting for contributions.

- Restricted contributions are recognized as revenue in the year in which the related expenses
 are incurred where no restricted fund has been set up by management.
- Unrestricted contributions are recognized as revenue when received or receivable if the amount to be received can be reasonably estimated and collection is reasonably assured.
- Membership revenue is recognized over the period of membership year
- · Conference fees are recognized when the event is held and completed
- · Publication and merchandise sales are recorded as revenue when received or receivable.
- Fees or grants received in advance are recorded as either deferred conference revenue, deferred fee revenue or deferred contributions, as applicable.
- Government assistance received towards continuing operations is included in determining net revenue for the year when approved. Subsidies and grants awarded under Coronavirus 19 pandemic (Covid-19) legislation, whether government or privately funded, is recognized as approved by the funding agency.
- Donations are recognized as revenue when the amounts are received or receivable.
- · Investment income is recognized as revenue when earned.
- Expenses are recorded when goods or services are consumed.

Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with Canadian generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenditures during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates. During the year, management booked estimates to the accounts pertaining to prepaid expenses, certain accrued liabilities, and deferred revenues. Additional estimates pertaining to subsidies applied for under Covid-19 pandemic legislation, include estimates of the qualifying revenue and wages used in the determination of subsidy revenue claims.

Income Tax Status

The association is a registered charitable organization pursuant to Section 149.1(1) of the Income Tax Act (Canada) and is, accordingly, exempt from tax.

2. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies - Continued

Financial Assets and Financial Liabilities

(i) Measurement of financial instruments

The Association initially measures its financial assets and financial liabilities at fair value. The Association subsequently measures all its financial assets and financial liabilities at amortized cost. Changes in fair value are recognized in the statements of operations in the period incurred. Financial assets measured at amortized cost include cash, short term investments and amounts receivable. Financial liabilities measured at amortized cost include accounts payable, accrued liabilities and deferred revenues.

(ii) Impairment

At the end of each reporting period, the Association assesses whether there are any indications that a financial asset measured at amortized cost may be impaired.

When there is an indication of impairment, the Association determines whether a significant adverse change has occurred during the period in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows from the financial asset.

When the Association identifies a significant adverse change in the expected timing or amount of future cash flows from a financial asset, it reduces the carrying amount of the asset to the highest of the following:

- a) the present value of the cash flows expected to be generated by holding the asset discounted using a current market rate of interest appropriate to the asset;
- the amount that could be realized by selling the asset at the statement of financial position date; and
- c) the amount the Association expects to realize by exercising its rights to any collection action less the costs necessary to exercise those actions.

When the Organization determines an adjustment to the carrying value is required, the carrying amount of the asset is reduced directly or through the use of an allowance account. The amount of the reduction is recognized as an impairment loss in the statements of operations. When the extent of impairment of a previously written-down asset decreases and the decrease can be related to an event occurring after the impairment was recognized, the previously recognized impairment loss is reversed to the extent of the improvement, directly or by adjusting the allowance account. The amount of the reversal is recognized in the statements of operations in the period the reversal occurs.

3. Investments

Investment(s) included in the cash position as at the year end include guaranteed investment certificates ("GICs"), the fair value of which is estimated at cost plus accrued interest to the year end date; and, is comprised of the following holding(s):

4. Collection

6. Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA)

In the fiscal 2021 year, the Organization applied for and received an initial \$40,000 loan under the Canada Emergency Business Account (CEBA) as part of the Federal government's Covid-19 relief legislation. Later in the 2021 year, the government program was expanded such that additional funds, in the amount of \$20,000, were made available to the Organization under the same terms and conditions, which allowed for an additional \$10,000 forgivable portion of the loan proceeds. The loan is interest-free and if paid by December 31, 2023, \$20,000 of the loan is forgivable. The Organization's management believes that the Organization will be in a position to allow for the repayment of the loan by the above specified date; therefore, the loan's forgivable portion of \$20,000 has been recognized as revenue in the year of receipt.

In addition, as a financial liability, the debt has been stated at its fair value taking into account the estimated cost of borrowing of 3% per annum at the time funds were advanced. The differential between the fair value as at the year end date and the \$40,000 face value of the re-payable portion of the loan, has also been included in revenue in the year funds were advanced and are being amortized as imputed interest to the date of maturity at a rate of \$59.06 monthly.

7. Internally Restricted Net Assets

To the end of the current fiscal year, the Board has transferred the net amount of \$38,535 (2022 - \$37,401) into the internally restricted reserve towards the ongoing operations of the Organization's programming which may be allocated to awards, capital, or to fund contingencies for future operations. During the current year, the management reserve was increased by \$1,134.

8. Government Loan Assistance under Covid-19 Legislation

Under the Covid-19 relief provisions announced by the Federal government and as administered by the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA), the Organization applied for the following programs;

Canada Emergency Wage Subsidy (CEWS)

The Organization was entitled to claim a percentage of wage subsidy, with restriction and limitations, for those employees retained on payroll, including any employees furloughed, during a qualifying claim period. The total claimed under this program amounted to \$8,927 in the 2022 fiscal year; however, as the program ceased on October 23, 2021, no further funds were forthcoming under this federal program.

8. Government Loan Assistance under Covid-19 Legislation - Continued

Canada Emergency Rent Subsidy (CERS)

Canada Emergency Rent Subsidy (CERS) - Government Assistance – Under the Covid-19 relief provisions announced by the Federal government and as administered by the CRA, the Organization applied for rent subsidy from September 27, 2020 to the termination date of the program on October 23, 2021. This program was not reliant on landlord participation, but followed the CEWS filing periods and was reliant on the percentage revenue drop in a qualifying claim period. The total claimed under this program amounted to \$1,098 in the 2022 fiscal year. As this program concluded on October 23, 2021 no further amounts have been subsequently received.

9. Arts Endowment Fund

The Organization has established the Fusion: The Ontario Clay and Glass Association Endowment Fund, which is administered by the Ontario Arts Council Foundation (OACF) under the terms of the Arts Endowment Fund (AEF) Program. The AEF is a program of the Government of Ontario through the Ministry of Citizenship, Culture and Recreation. Money contributed and matched under the AEF program is held in perpetuity and is non-expendable; accordingly, the assets in the endowment fund are excluded from these financial statements. Investment income earned is made available to the Organization for ongoing programming. Income received from the fund during the year amounted to \$3,851 (2022 - \$4,124); and, is included with interest and other revenue in these financial statements. The market value of the Fund at year end is approximately \$75,746 (2022 - \$78,721).

10. Lease Commitment and Subsequent Event

The Association renewed its lease agreement for its operating premises which expired on October 31, 2021. The renewed lease is for a period of three years commencing November 1, 2021 and ending on October 31, 2024. There is no option to renew under the current arrangement. Minimum lease commitments, which provide for an annual escalation of 2 percent each year, are as follows:

11. Risk

General

The Organization holds financial assets in the form of cash, investments, and accounts receivable. It is management's opinion that the fair value of these financial instruments approximates their stated value, plus accrued interest where applicable, due to the short term to maturity for the items held at year end.

The Organization also holds liquid financial liabilities in the form of accounts payable and accrued liabilities, and deferred revenue. Unless otherwise noted, the fair value and stated carrying value of the financial liabilities approximate each other at year end due to the short term to maturity of the liabilities and debts held at March 31, 2023.

The Organization also held a debt in the form of a government loan (Note 6). The fair value of the debt was stated at a discounted value which approximated its fair value.

Liquidity Risk

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Organization will encounter difficulty in meeting its obligations associated with its financial liabilities. The Organization expects to meet these obligations as they come due by generating sufficient cash flows from operations, grants and fundraising.

Credit Risk

Credit risk is the risk that one part to a financial instrument will cause a financial loss for the other party by failing to meet its funding obligation. This risk is mitigated by the Association through ensuring revenue is derived from qualified sources. No allowance for doubtful accounts in relation to accounts receivable has been booked in either the current or prior fiscal year.

Other Risks

It is management's opinion that the Association is not exposed to significant currency, interest, credit or market risks arising from its financial instruments held at year end.

12. Comparative Figures

Comparative figures for the 2022 fiscal year were reported in an unqualified audit report dated August 21, 2022. My firm was appointed as accountant of the Organization for the fiscal 2023 year as management opted for the performance of a review engagement as opposed to an audit engagement in the current year; accordingly, while the current year's results are not audited, those of the previous year, were reported on under an audit engagement.

In addition, certain comparative figures have been reclassified to conform to the current year's presentation format.
